<p>I am an applied microeconomist who takes advantage of historical episodes to study currently relevant questions that would be hard to tackle in contemporary settings. My research intersects themes in innovation, labor economics, and economic history.</p> <p>The development of new technologies is the core driver of long-run economic growth. However, the gains from technological progress are shared unequally across countries and among groups within society. The unifying purpose of my research agenda is to understand how innovations diffuse across and within countries to generate sustainable and inclusive growth, focusing in particular on international migrations, labor markets, and culture. In addition, I investigate if and how regulators can propel these processes.</p> <p>My research takes full advantage of recent advances in digitization technologies, such as optical character recognition and AI-powered parsing methods, to construct novel machine-usable data from unstructured rich primary sources. In addition, I harness state-of-the-art record linkage techniques applied to large-scale demographic datasets to construct new and detailed comprehensive data sources. By combining these cutting-edge methodological tools with economic theory, rigorous causal research designs, and insights from historical scholarship, my research offers an unusually rich perspective on crucial questions for long-run economic growth and inequality.</p>
